


Uninsurance Rates Increased for Children in 2023


Findings from the Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplement (CPS ASEC)

New data from the Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplement (CPS ASEC) show that in national uninsurance rates for the total U.S. population and for nonelderly adults (age 19-64) did not statistically change from 2022 to 2023. However, uninsurance rates significantly increased among children (age 0-18), from 5.4% in 2022 to 5.8% in 2023. Uninsurance rates among nonelderly adults and children living in Medicaid expansion states also rose from 2022 to 2023.

Notes: † Because of rounding, the percentage point change and the difference between the published estimates do not match. All changes are tested at the 90% confidence level. All estimates are from the 2023 and 2024 Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplements, which provide data for years 2022 and 2023, respectively. Uninsured estimates represent individuals with no health insurance coverage for the entire calendar year. Estimates of health insurance coverage type represent individuals with that type of coverage at any point during the calendar year. Types of health insurance coverage are not mutually exclusive.
