


NATIONAL CHANGES ACROSS PRIVATE & PUBLIC INSURANCE COVERAGE IN 2024




Overall Changes by Coverage Type, 2023 to 2024




Private vs. Public Coverage Changes, 2023 to 2024


Changes by Race/Ethnicity




Changes by Immigration Status

Notes: All changes are tested at the 90% confidence level. All estimates come from the 2024 and 2025 Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplements, which provide data for years 2023 and 2024, respectively. Uninsured estimates represent individuals with no health insurance coverage for the entire calendar year. Estimates of health insurance coverage type represent individuals with that type of coverage at any point during the calendar year. Types of health insurance coverage are not mutually exclusive, meaning that individuals may be counted in more than one category if they switch coverage types during the calendar year. States that have not expanded Medicaid coverage (nonexpansion states) include: Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kansas, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin, and Wyoming
